MILITARY PARTNERSHIP

Launched in 2004, the HonorHealth Military Partnership Program provides trauma and deployment training to all branches of the military, active duty, National Guard and Reserves. The 7,500-square-foot training center is located on the HonorHealth Scottsdale Osborn Medical Center campus. The program offers:

- U.S. Air Force Magnet and Surgical Leadership Fellowship
- Readiness skill sustainment training
- Medical simulation training
- Nurse Transition Program
- Critical Care/Emergency Trauma Nursing Fellowship

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Definition of terms

Charity care for low-income patients: Free or discounted health services provided to persons who cannot afford to pay and who meet the eligibility criteria of HonorHealth's financial assistance policy. Financial assistance is reported in terms of costs, not charges.

Costs of unpaid Medicaid (AHCCCS): Unpaid costs of public programs for low-income persons — the shortfall created when HonorHealth receives payments that are less than the cost of caring for public program beneficiaries.

Community health improvements and other benefits: Costs associated with activities implemented to improve community health, such as community health education and community-based clinical services. These services include health services and screenings for underinsured and uninsured persons, support groups, health education lectures and workshops by team members to community groups, health promotion and wellness programs, and healthcare support services, such as enrollment assistance in public programs. This category includes the costs of clinical educational programs for physicians, interns and residents, medical students, nurses and nursing students, and other health professionals. The category also includes the costs of clinical and community health research.

Also included are costs to improve the community's health and safety by addressing the root causes of health problems, such as poverty, homelessness and environmental hazards. These activities strengthen our community's capacity to promote the health and well-being for its residents.

Costs of unpaid Medicare: Unpaid costs of public programs, such as Medicare and the shortfall created when HonorHealth receives payments that are less than the cost of caring for public program beneficiaries.
